Claire Chino (08,09) Breaks the Glass Ceiling in Her Industry

laire Mitsuru Chino (08,09) made history on April 1st as she stepped into her new position as Executive Officer and General Manager of Itochu Corporation's legal division. Not only is Claire the first female to rise to an executive leadership position at Itochu, but she also has the distinction of being the youngest and first female executive at any major Japanese trading company.

After graduating from Cornell Law School, Claire became a partner at an American law firm before returning to Japan in 2000 to join Itochu. As Corporate Counsel for Itochu, Claire negotiated and supervised a wide breadth of multi-billion dollar, international prjects and was instrumental in bridging the gender gap by being tapped early on to be part of of Itochu's "Diversity Initiative" taskforce that worked to double

the number of females in non-administrative positions in under five years.

Claire put her leadership skills to

work for the public sector when she helped establish Table for Two in 2006 and BEYOND Tomorrow in 2011. As many of you know, and may have even experienced, Claire also sings classical music semi-professionally. This past December she gave a recital at Suntory Hall in Tokyo, the proceeds of which were given to BEYOND Tomorrow.

Upon her recent appointment, Claire shared this message: "It is a tremendous privilege and honor to be appointed to this position. I believe what is important going forward is to have a calm state of mind. In order to achieve this, I believe that friends from outside my corporate life, such as those from the United States Japan Leadership Program, are so vital. I hope you will allow me to call upon you from time to time for your wisdom!"

Q&A with Doshisha University's New President Koji Murata (00)

USJLP: Congratulations on your appointment as the new President of Doshisha University. How do you feel and what are your thoughts as you assume the position?

Koji: Thank you very much. It will be great honor and challenge for me, indeed. I would like to do my best for my alma mater.

We understand that Doshisha's Founder Jo Niijima had a strong will to internationalize then-closed Japan. Could you tell us about the uniqueness of Doshisha, and the university you would like Doshisha to become during your tenure?

Jo Niijima was the first Japanese who graduated from a Western higher educational institution, Amherst College. He wanted to establish an Amherst College in Japan in order to "civilize" his country not only materially but also spiritually. Doshisha is a private, Christian university in a country where the ratio of Christian population is about 1% of en-

tire population. Diversity and tolerance to others are the most important values for us and I would like to promote these values further on our campus.

Could you tell us about the recent election process for presidency at Doshisha University? We understand that it is unique in utilizing the web.

My colleagues recommended that I run for the position to promote generational change in leadership. It was my idea to run my platform online for a more democratic and open election.

What kinds of changes do you envision during your tenure as President?

I would like to improve our university governance with better representation and efficiency and communications among the faculties, students, and graduates. Also, I would like to expand our international exchanges.

What are the expectations you have of Japanese students as they become

global leaders? What do you encourage in your students?

For becoming global leaders, you must learn about good followership in advance. In this sense, local viewpoints and citizenship education are of great value for global leadership, I believe.

What role does Doshisha University play in the national context, given its location in Kyoto?

In order to promote diversity and tolerance in Japanese society, we have to develop cooperation with local governing bodies and business and cultural communities in Kyoto. Also, we would like to promote academic and cultural ties with non-capital cities in the world, and facilitate religious dialogues among Christianity, Judaism, and Islam.

Lastly, what message do you have for your fellow USJLPers?

Please come to Kyoto and visit Doshisha!


